Hats off to 2015 grads

Warm weather and brisk ocean breezes on June 7, graduation day for Cape Elizabeth High School's Class of 2015, seemed fitting for a class known for its spirit and sense of fun.

During commencement ceremonies at Fort Williams, Principal Jeff Shedd praised the creativity of the class, whose members celebrated their final days at CEHS by camping out one night on the high school track field and chalking their college logos and messages of gratitude to school staff members on the sidewalk in front of CEHS.

Shedd urged class members to let their spirit and enthusiasm continue to inspire them.

"What I want to suggest is that you work hard at college not only at making new friends but also at finding important adults who can mentor and guide you," Shedd said. "... Talk to the adults around you. Don't let your professors sit in their offices twiddling their thumbs. Claim adults. One or more will become important friends, advisors, and guides."

Shedd awarded Cape Elizabeth High School Citizenship Awards to nine in the class: Rhoen Fiutak, Sierra Bates, Matty Barth, Eva Brydson, Haylee Walsh, Josie Spidle, Arden Wing, Hunter Kent, and Daniel Menz.

Award-winning concert pianist Henry Kramer, who graduated from CEHS in 2005, received the nonprofit Cape Elizabeth Education Foundation's 2015 Alumni Award, given annually to

School budget approved, with mixed feelings

Cape Elizabeth voters approved the \$23.5 million school budget for 2015-16 in a validation election held June 9. Voter turnout was a mere 11 percent, with 867 ballots cast, 635 approving the school budget and 236 disapproving the budget. Citizen approval of the school budget is mandated by state law.

The referendum ballot also asked for a "non-binding expression of opinion" regarding the budget, which had been reduced by the Town Council by \$110,539 in May, so that it would have "zero-impact" on proper-

ty taxes. The reduction of the school budget had been unexpected and resulted in "frustration and disappointment" on the part of School Board members, according to a statement given by School Board Chair Joanna Morrissey at a public hearing held May 11, prior to the Town Council's final 4-3 vote on the budget. The controversy was reflected in the spread of opinions, with 363 ballots indicating that the budget was "too low," 274 indicating that the budget was "too high," and 231 indicating that the budget was "acceptable."

Cape schools may share food services director

The Cape Elizabeth School Department is moving forward with plans to share the services of School Nutrition Director Peter Esposito with Scarborough schools. The news was reported by School Superintendent Meredith Nadeau at the School Board's June 9 meeting.

Nadeau said that the cost of Esposito's salary and benefits would be shared on a 60/40 percent basis, with Scarborough taking the larger share, an estimated savings to Cape Elizabeth of between \$15,000 and

\$20,000.

Nadeau also anticipated "essentially a tripling of our purchasing power" with the pooling of resources, and increased access to affordable fresh ingredients and less reliance on processed foods.

Describing Scarborough schools' values as "pretty well aligned with ours," Nadeau said that there would be opportunities for shared training and facilities and other improvements. Noting that Scarborough schools had master gardeners on the faculty,



Beach to Beacon still needs volunteers

The TD Beach to Beacon 10K Road Race is looking for volunteers to help staff its award-winning greening program, and to work in the medical tent, at this year's race, to be held Aug. 1.

"The TD Beach to Beacon race recently earned a gold certification for its greening program, and that's partly because we have expanded our recycling program that includes composting, bike corrals, expanded parking areas and shuttle bus operations over the years," said Volunteer Coordinator Maya Cohen of Cape Elizabeth. "So our volunteer needs in these areas continue to grow."

Cohen said the medical tent is another area where volunteers are needed. Both licensed and non-licensed medical professionals are

welcome, she said, including doctors, nurses, EMTs, medical assistants and students in training.

"We're ahead of schedule this year with many of our volunteers from previous years signing up again, but we still have needs in these important key areas," Cohen added.

In return for their efforts, volunteers receive a tech running shirt provided by Nike and are invited to an outdoor party with food, music and prizes during race week. The race needs about 800 volunteers to ensure a smooth operation.

Winter moth population monitored in Cape

The feeding phase of the winter moth caterpillar is now complete, with "the defoliation you currently see ... as extensive as it will be this year," Cape Elizabeth Tree Warden Mike Duddy reported in his "Winter Moth Update" of June 15. Cape Elizabeth, along with Kittery, Harpswell and Vinalhaven, is a primary feeding ground for the nonnative insect in Maine.

Defoliation in Cape Elizabeth appears to be "a bit less drastic than in the past couple of years," according to Duddy. The defoliation of oaks and other hardwood trees is "noticeably less extensive than two summers ago," Duddy said, while acknowledging "pockets of severe (ie. complete) defoliation."

Duddy also noted that while the winter moth caterpillar usually favors oaks, this year maples seem to also be hard hit and other hardwoods, such as cherries, "are being defoliated to an extent not seen in prior years."

According to Duddy, there appear to be two factors causing the winter moth population in Cape Elizabeth to subside, at least on oaks. The first is environmental. "The moth phase of the winter moth lifecycle occurs at the end of November and the first week or two of December. Harsh weather in this window can kill off some of the moths," Duddy explained. "For the last two years in a row,

we had very cold temperatures and snow during the first week of December. Each of the following summers has seen a reduced caterpillar population."

"The second factor has to do with bio-control efforts," said Duddy. "In 2013, and again this year, the Maine Forest Service released thousands of parasitic flies in Cape Elizabeth. The flies attack the winter moth (and don't bother anything else). These bio-control efforts may also be having an effect on the winter moth population in Cape."

Duddy said that the defoliation "typically does not kill a tree," with most healthy trees having sufficient "stored reserves to survive even several seasons of early summer defoliation." An already stressed tree may be more adversely affected.

The town consults with entomologists from the Maine Forest Service to monitor its winter moth population and keep it in check. Duddy says that chemical and other treatments may help protect individual trees, but only at a specific time or year and stage of the winter moth's lifestyle. Consultation with an arborist is recommended.



Summer programs for all ages underway

The library's summer reading programs for all ages are underway. There is an early literacy program for babies and young toddlers, a reading and read-aloud program for preschool through elementary school, a tween/teen program, and a program for adults.

New math program offered

The library is also offering a new program this year through the nonprofit foundation Bedtime Math, which has the mission of "helping kids love numbers so they can handle the math in real life." The Bedtime Math program encourages parents to do a math problem with their child each night as part of the bedtime ritual. Children who complete the Bedtime Math program will receive a glow-in-the-dark Bedtime Math Frisbee.

Percussion workshop June 25

West African drumming teacher and performer Annegret Baier will present a percussion workshop for preschoolers and their grownups from 10:30 to 11:15 a.m. on June 25. Baier will read a West African Anansi story, play drums, and have children and caregivers play percussion instruments along with her. Both programs are geared for ages 3 to 5.

Musical story hour returns

Jud Caswell will present his monthly

Musical Story Hour for ages 3 and up from 10:30 to 11:15 a.m. on Thursday, July 2. All are welcome.

Superhero celebration

The library's busy schedule of craft and activity programs for children kicks off the first week of July with several programs celebrating superheroes. Children ages 7 to 12 can register to participate in the "Superhero Training Academy," which begins on Wednesday July 1 from 3:30 to 4:15 p.m. In this first session, children will make a wrist band and cape as part of their own superhero outfit. In other sessions, kids will make a helmet and armor. The library will offer each session two times – once in July and again in August. Preregistration is required and each program will be limited to 12 children.

Younger kids can design their own superhero on Monday, July 6 from 10:30 to 11:15 a.m. Using fabric, yarn and paper, kids ages 5 to 8 will be able to make a superhero outfit for their own cardboard mini-superhero. Preregistration for this program is required so that the library can ensure adequate materials for all participants.

Lyme Disease prevention program

At 6 p.m. on Thursday, June 25, Bob Maurais from Mainely Ticks will discuss strategies to better protect your family from ticks and tick-borne diseases.

Items discussed will include personal protection strategies, landscape modifications and the life cycle of the deer tick. Educational literature will be distributed including tick identification guides and bookmarks. The 25 minute presentation will be followed by a question-and-answer session, for which participants may stay as long as they like.

The program is free and registration is not required.

Storyteller and musician Jennifer Armstrong will perform for families at the library on July 7

Popular storyteller and musician Jennifer Armstrong will present stories and songs for families from 10:30 to 11:15 a.m. on Tuesday, July 7.

In her "Every Hero has a Story" program, Armstrong will tell stories of courage, honesty, compassion, generosity and curiosity, including "Sopa da Pedra" (stone soup), "Soot Face," and "Mother Noola Weaves the Night Sky."

Armstrong's stories are presented with music played on musical instruments including the bagpipes, fiddle, and banjo.

There will also be a dancing puppet known as "Limberjack."

This program is free and appropriate for families with children ages 3 and older. No

registration is necessary.

Library summer hours in effect now; library to close from July 20 to Aug. 1



a graduate who has made a positive contribution to the community, to society or to a profession. Kramer's parents, Pat and Asher, spoke on behalf of their son, who was performing in Philadelphia the day of graduation.

"At my graduation from Cape in 2005, I performed right here on the concrete bleachers on an electronic keyboard," Kramer said. "Someone forgot to lock the wheels during the performance, and the keyboard kept inching forward towards the precipice, nearly squashing all of my friends. However, everyone pushed back towards the piano so that the performance could go on ... As comic as this situation was, it symbolizes the way my peers and the entire Cape Elizabeth community supported my music-making, allowing me ultimately to get to where I am today."

CEHS Spanish teacher Alison Gwyther, selected by the class to be the faculty speaker, discussed happiness and how to achieve it. Compassion and the ability to slow down and "listen" are essential, she said, and so is courage.

"When you embrace your fear, you don't deny its existence," Gwyther told the class. "... But you get to work with fear, kind of hand-in-hand. And that is when fear no longer has control over you. And in turn, you feel happiness."

Music at the ceremony included a choral performance by seniors Claire Zimmerman and Devin Maguire, to the accompaniment of Aaron Dobieski and Becca Tarling, and a jazz performance by seniors Andrew Harrington, Sam MacDuffie, Aaron Dobieski, Zach Vaughan, Leo Wing and Charlie Tall.

Ben Stanley, whom fellow classmates chose as student speaker, reminded the soon-to-be graduates to look to the past when considering the future.

"Instead of trying to handle the weight of a distant future, I urge you all instead to look at the past," he said. "... We got here by waking up every morning and learning – and by 'learning,' I don't just mean sitting through math class. I also mean reading the paper, or going on a date, or hanging out with some friends. Because in my opinion, that's what learning is. It means orienting yourself in the world you live in, not with any objective, but hopefully with the faith that with every experience you have, you understand yourself and others more than you did before."

Valedictorian Lily Jordan urged classmates to recall not only their academic learning at CEHS but also the people who made their high school experiences worthwhile.

"All that valuable academic knowledge is meaningless to us without the context of the people we learned it with, the place where

Cape Elizabeth gets a fourth lighthouse



Residents of all ages can play pickleball on three courts at Fort Williams Park

Cape Elizabeth residents who have noticed red lines on tennis courts at Fort Williams may wonder why the lines are there. The answer: pickleball.

What is pickleball? The fastest growing sport in the country, pickleball can be described as a combination of table tennis, tennis and badminton. People of all ages play the sport, typically on a 20-by-44-foot badminton court with a net lowered to 34 inches in the middle. Players use a baseball-sized plastic ball and a paddle similar to one used for table tennis to volley the ball back and forth to score on the opposing team.

Pickleball's small court allows younger players and people with varying levels of mobility to participate in a way that a larger tennis court sometimes prohibits. The sport allows grandparents to play a competitive game with grandchildren. The sport is now played in physical education classes at high schools across the country, including Cape Elizabeth High School.

Last year a group of residents approached the Fort William Advisory Commission about painting lines on the single court up on the hill by Officer's Row. Last month, the group went back to the commission again to get permission to paint lines on the two courts near the pond. The group got the go-ahead, so Fort Williams now has three courts where pickleball players can play.

After a one-year trial, the Fort Williams Advisory Commission will review its decision to allow pickleball on all three courts and also discuss adding more pickleball courts in town.

At a meeting this spring, tennis players, pickleball players, Cape Elizabeth Public Works Director Bob Malley and the chair of the Fort Williams Advisory Commission worked out a plan.

Pickleball players will continue to play at the single court on the hill. When a lot of people want to play pickleball, they can also play on the two pond-side courts even while tennis is being played on one of the courts.

Both tennis and pickleball players have a 90-minute time limit for play when other people want to play either of the sports.

A parakeet who landed on a tree at Appletree School while students were outside with their teacher has done her part for the school curriculum.

"Looking for and identifying birds is a big part of the curriculum at Appletree," owner and director Pam Mullin said. Recently "when teacher Carrie Croft and a group of preschoolers noticed a pale blue and white parakeet in the trees, they knew at once that it was something out of the ordinary."

With some coaxing, the sky-blue female budgie, who students named Blueberry Ski Ocean, flew to Croft's finger. After Croft and another teacher used a butterfly net to secure Blueberry in a cage, Mullin, who has owned parakeets in the past, helped students identify the bird and shared some facts.

Birds seem to flock to the school. Students have spotted cardinals, mallards and a turkey, Mullin said.

"One spring, a peregrine falcon even found its way to the playground," she said.

Hoping to reunite Blueberry with her owner, Appletree staff members have notified Cape Elizabeth police, veterinarians, the Animal Refuge League, and Windham-based Spark's Ark, which offers wildlife rehabilitation and educational programs.

"It is not uncommon for parakeets to escape," said Mullin, who recently met a Cape Elizabeth resident who lost a brightly colored lovebird this spring.

Students and staff hope to spread the word about Blueberry and the missing lovebird.





she described the neighboring town as "a little bit ahead of us with gardening curricula."

Nadeau envisioned an expansion of Cape's partnership with local farms and increased ability to bring in more varied farm-fresh foods in greater amounts.

"We have a very strong food director who I think has done good work for us," Nadeau concluded. "You know, as a small district we can't compete with some larger districts in

terms of the salary and benefits, and when you have a strong person like that, the risk of losing them increases as opportunities present themselves. So to me that's not the driving force, but it certainly is an added benefit of this arrangement."

If finalized, the work of Esposito will be the second service to be newly shared with Scarborough this year. Assessor Matt Sturgis is currently working for both towns following approval of the arrangement by the respective town councils of Cape and Scarborough in April.




